

26 ARGYLL & BUTE BEN CRUACHAN & MEALL CUANAIL

Distance: 6½ miles/10.5km Time: 6 hours Grade: Challenging









HOSEN BY **KEITH FERGUS** The name Ben Cruachan sends

a tingle down the spine of many a hillwalker, such is the regard this peak holds in the pantheon of exceptional Scottish mountains. This route is tough but good paths run most of the way and there are some incredible views For a circular route it is worth climbing over Meall Cuanail although the descent is over pathless ground, and so perhaps best left for a clear day.

Start

Walk begins from lay-by on A85 just east of Cruachan Dam Visitor Centre – its car park is only for those making use of

centre Climb steps (signposted Falls of Cruachan) towards Falls of Cruachan Railway Station. Just before platform pass under railway line, continue to path on L. Steep ascent proceeds through woodland high above eastern side of Allt Cruachan gorge, After climbing stile over deer fence, path continues across hillside to gain Cruachan Dam access road

34 mile/1.25km

Turn L. cross bridge over river then, when beneath enormous dam wall, turn I over low fence. Indistinct path rises to track, which is followed along western side of reservoir. in full view of Coire Cruachan. After 1.25km it ends at reservoir's northern tip.



Make L onto an initially faint path that runs to the R of a fast flowing burn. The path improves as it climbs steadily west into secluded Coire Dearg. Approaching Cruachan's huge headwall, gradient steepens to gain Bealach an Lochain at 840m contour line. Tiny loch that gives pass its name lies here. Views to Mull are superb.

4 3 miles/4.75km
Turn R, ascend north,
where there are large boulders
to cross. The path can be
indistinct and care is required
to reach Ben Cruachan's
compact 1126m summit,
but the rewards is a view
of immense proportions.
The vista along Loch Etive to
the Glen Etive and Glen Coe
mountains is phenomenal.

53½ miles/5.5km
Carefully descend back to bealach, paying attention to steep, awkward ground. From here steps can be retraced but for fine route extension climb south alongside old fenceposts to reach Meall Cuanail's 918m top and outstanding view of Ben Cruachan's flowing ridge.

64% miles/6.75km
Initial part of descent
keeps L of fenceposts,
dropping east then south over
pathless ground. Once flatter,
boggier section is gained fence
veers away southwest. From

here descend in easterly direction, grassy ground relatively easy to cover, only steepening when it drops down to regain track near the Cruachan Dam wall.

Turn R, retrace steps back to Loch Awe.
